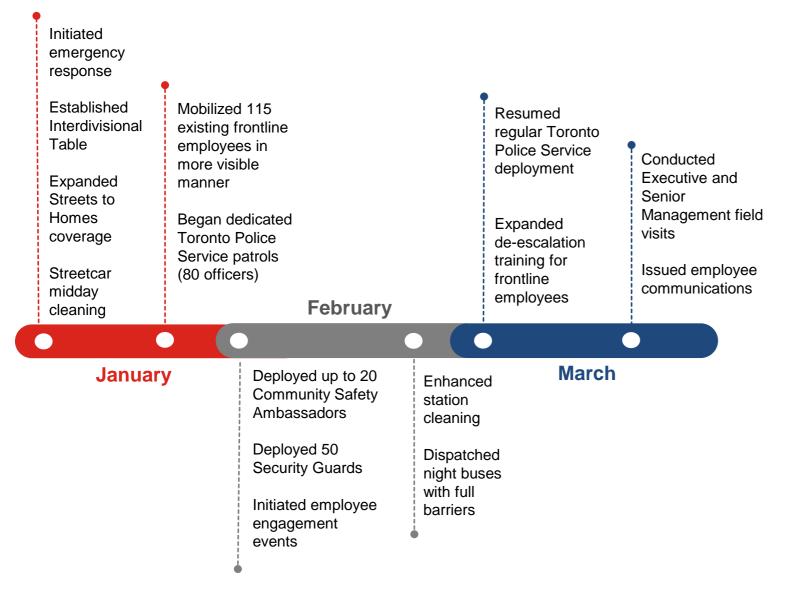

Timeline of Initiatives



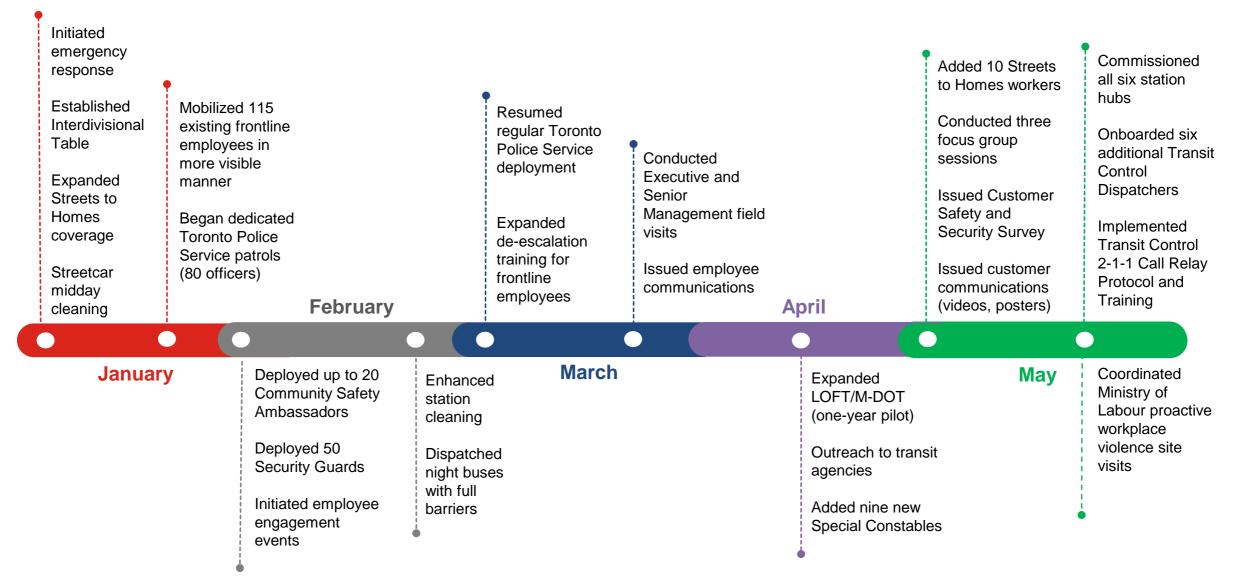

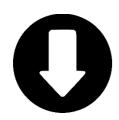

Key Findings from our Assessment



Decrease in offences

Noticeable decrease in offences against both customers and employees since January 2023.



Sense of personal safety

Sense of personal safety remains a key challenge area for the TTC.

Customers reported that staff presence was the most important feature to enhance a sense of safety.



De-escalation, intervention and supports Security Guards and Community Safety Ambassadors play a role in de-escalating and resolving incidents.

Ongoing social services interventions continue to help establish relationships with vulnerable persons and provide them with access to supports.



Multi-Disciplinary Approach

High-visibility presence and incident management

- Increase by 130 Customer Service Agents, 30 Supervisors, one Slip Clerk
- Increase by four Janitors
- Maintain six Transit Control
 Dispatchers
- Maintain 50 Security Guards
- Enhance the current security deployment model
- Continue Toronto Police Service patrols

Social supports for individuals in need

- Mobilize dedicated transport and temporary shelter buses (includes increase by six bus Operators)
- Extend the one-year LOFT/M-DOT pilot program
- Maintain 20 Streets to Homes
 resources
- Maintain 20 Community Safety Ambassadors

Community safety program support

- Obtain a dedicated community safety program manager
- Obtain the services of a consultant to conduct a community safety and security review



Board Recommendations

It is recommended that the TTC Board:

- 1. Reaffirm its support for the TTC's multi-disciplinary approach to managing community safety, security and well-being issues on the system
- 2. Support the continuation of the 2023 approved measures in place and the new measures for the balance of 2023 with projected costs of \$10.3 million
- 3. Authorize the following:
 - Continuation of the LOFT/M-DOT pilot for one additional year
 - Increase in the TTC's 2023 approved complement of 178 and include the adjustment in the City's nine-month variance report
 - Include an increase of \$8.3 million to cover costs for Q1 2024 and \$26.8 million for the total costs for 2024
- 4. Forward this report to the City Manager and Interim Chief Financial Officer and Treasurer for information
